Celebration Worship and Church Services – a polite request...

Most of you have been with the community long enough, I hope, to know that we take great pride in being a warm, welcoming and inclusive school. With all of that in mind therefore, I ask that you bear the following in mind when you attend church services and collective worship in school.

- ★ Follow the cues from the children and other adults in the room and sit quietly when coming into worship. Listen to the music and enjoy a moment of stillness and peace.
- ★ Try to avoid laughing at mistakes or unavoidable 'moments' when things don't go to plan – it makes it hard for us to maintain the right atmosphere and tone.
- ★ Please take small children out of the room if they are very noisy or at all upset. We fully recognise that siblings are a vital part of our community, not least because they are the future of our school. However, lots of noise from little children can often overwhelm the children who are presenting or stop us hearing what is being said. Please consider not bringing siblings if you really want to be present and know that your young child will find it hard to manage.
- Remain quiet until the children have left the hall.

 Our expectation is that children leave silently to the music that is being played.

Please take the above in the spirit that it is intended. We have extremely high expectations of your children for their behaviour and their attitudes to their learning, in all aspects of school life. We need your support to ensure that our Friday celebrations particularly are an uplifting, positive and joy filled end to our week.

Remembrance Collective Worship

Children in Need – The Heaviest Backpack – Friday 15th November

This year, Children in Need Day is about exploring the idea that some children live with worries and in situations that can feel like a backpack with heavy weights in it. The idea is to get everyone thinking about how this weight can be alleviated and that ultimately it is not the responsibility of children to be carrying such a load in the first place. We will explore this with the children in assemblies and class discussion times on the day and in the lead up. To mark this, children can decorate their backpacks with anything that brings light and joy or would make another person simply smile when they saw it. This is not compulsory. We will be collecting donations on the gate in the morning by way of our school contribution to this charity. We would suggest a minimum donation of £1.

St Katharine's Day - Bun Making

St Katharine's Day is being celebrated on Monday 25th November with a short service in church at 9:30am. Thank you to those parents who have already volunteered to make cakes for the day. We need about 100 small cakes and therefore if there are a couple more parents willing to volunteer you would be most welcome. Please let us know by emailing or calling Hayley in the school office. Attendance Update

Current whole school attendance data: 96.7% Our end of year attendance target is: 97%

We are increasing the number of attendance audits that we complete from three to six this year. This enables us to track attendance more closely, spot any trends where they exist and act early to support parents if attendance is becoming a concern. The advantage of being part of an academy trust is that there are people in key roles such as a newly appointed attendance lead, who can support the work of principals, giving advice and guidance where it might be required. Where attendance falls below 90% we will write to you, primarily to flag this to you. Please know that this is done to support parents, keep them informed and to share data transparently with them. We know that children get ill and it is certainly not our intention for parents to feel a pressure to return unwell children to school, too early. That said, knowing that your child's attendance has fallen below

90% (equivalent to 0.5 days a week by the end of the school year) can help you when making decisions about time away from school. Please note that 90% represents different things proportionally at different times of the school year. A few days off early in Term 1 can affect attendance data quite drastically. Please know that we take all of this into account when analysing the data in front of us.

Always talk to us if you are at all concerned about attendance or would like some clarity or more information about the changes to attendance policy. Great school attendance is **always** the result of a partnership.

Barry the Bat!

Meet Barry the Bat, as he was affectionately named by one of the children. Barry visited us for the whole day on Tuesday, much to everyone's delight (including the staff)! Barry took up shelter underneath the playtime equipment box and didn't seem at all phased by 100 small faces peering at him (from a safe distance) and much curious chatter. We are pleased to report that thankfully Barry moved on overnight and we regained access to the equipment! It was however a pleasure while it lasted.





Parents' Evenings

Parents will receive an email next week giving details about the upcoming Parents' Evenings happening on 26th and 28th November. The sessions are being held via video call. The booking window for making appointments is 18th to 22nd November.

Sharing Our Learning Afternoon

Prior to parents' evenings (on 26th and 28th November) there is an opportunity for you to come into school from **2:30pm on Thursday 21st November** to share books with your child/ren. We hope this will give you a bit of context before meeting with your child's teacher and enable you to share the progress that your child is making and the things that they are proud of. Once you have finished, we are happy for children to go home a little early providing you let the class teacher know. Please use the classroom entrances or come through reception.

Free School Meals

If you are in receipt of benefits (e.g. Income Support, Job Seekers Allowance, Employment and Support Allowance, Universal Credit, Child Tax Credit) you are eligible for Free School Meals for your child or children. You would also be eligible for the Holiday Activity and Food Programme run by the Council and the Household Support Grant school holiday food payments. These entitlements are benefits-related and irrespective of the year group your child is in. The Government also gives money (£1,480 per primary school child) to the school to help support children from lower income families – this funding is used in many different ways from additional reading support, additional hours for support assistants as well as supporting extra-curricular opportunities. This funding is called Pupil Premium. However, you must qualify and register for free school meals to receive extra funds and for the school to see these in their budgets. If you don't want your child to have the free school meals they can continue as normal, you are not obliged to take the meal. As long as you qualify and are registered the school still receives the extra funding this brings. You can apply online or alternatively download the form and either send it directly to the Council or we can send it on your behalf. There is also access to a small pot of funds (by conversation with the school) in order to ensure children have equal access to extra-curricular activities including trips and clubs. Please get in touch with us if you would like to find out more.

The benefits related funds detailed above is quite apart from *Infant Free School Meals*. All children in Reception, years 1 and 2 are eligible to this. It is important however that you still apply for any benefits related funding even if your child is in Reception or Years 1 and

2 so that the school still receives the Pupil Premium funding.

Lost Property

The basket of lost property is currently overflowing! At last count, there were 15 plastic food containers of varying sizes, a pair of school shoes and 12 school jumpers/cardigans, plus other random items. We ask that you please remember to name your items and uniform to enable us to reunite them with their owner and avoid items ending up in lost property. We encourage you to call in to have a look through the lost property basket to see if anything belongs to you. Towards the end of term, all lost property will be put on a table near the school gate at the end of each day for parents to look through. All remaining lost property at the end of term will be put into the donation station or given to local charity shops.

Harvest Festival Donations

We received another fantastic amount of donations from you all for the Devizes Foodbank again this year. Please see the photograph below. We provided 90.3kgs to the charity. The Foodbank Team are grateful for our generosity.

We need urgent action to end hunger in our community. Local people are turning to us for emergency food

and practical support because they don't have enough money to line on. This lash right.

As you know, Devizes and District Footbank is part of the Trassell community of food banks across the UK.

Trassell recently conducted research with a wide range of audiences, and found our shared identity, which was first developed over 20 years ago, was creating some significant bankers:

Community Organiser update - August to October

The last three months have been focused on the campaign around ensuring social housing contex with al, St-for-purpose Scoring and window coverings - An Empty House lant A Home.

This compaign states that social landlords, whether housing association or local authority, should be responsible for these liens. Many tenants cannot afford the hundreds to thousands of pounds needed to rovide flooring in a property, on top of aiready having to buy all white goods, furniture and electrical goods if they don't already have these.

The cost of these liters, or the impact of going without, is one of the drivers pushing local people towards needing to use a food bank, especially subvenible households or households with children. So far, we have gathered extensive data, written to all major social focusing providers, chained two focuses.
